This is not "just" an infraction. The Department of Motor vehicles charges a fee of \$175 to reinstate a driver's license. Your family's auto insurance company will be notified, and your insurance policy may be cancelled or the cost will rise sharply. If you go to Court with a lawyer, you will pay a sizable retainer fee for the lawyer's services, usually thousands of dollars.

It is a **crime** to possess 0.5 oz or more. Possession of up to 4 oz. results in a fine of up to \$1,000 or imprisonment for no more than one year, or both; a subsequent offense results in a fine of up to \$3,000 or imprisonment for no more than 5 years, or both. Possession of more than 4 oz. results in a fine of up to \$2,000 or imprisonment for no more than five years or both; a subsequent offense results in a fine of up to \$5,000 or imprisonment for no more than 10 years, or both.

Synthetic Products and Salvia

All synthetic marijuana, bath salts, and salvia products are now **banned** in Connecticut and in the entire U.S. They may not be sold nor may someone be in possession of these products. The new and comprehensive regulations cover all the chemicals used to make these products so clever makers will no longer be able to claim that their products are "legal." The Drug Enforcement Agency recently raided manufacturers located all over the country.

These products are sold in small, colorful, foil packages. They carry names such as Zero Gravity, Revolution III, Space Cadet Chronic, Half Baked, Mr. Happy, K2, Spice, Pep Spice, Spice Silver, Spice Gold, Spice Diamond, Smoke, Sence, Skunk, Yucatan Fire, Genie, Zohai, etc. They are labeled "not for human consumption." CT bill on marijuana for medical use: schools

The bill prohibits anyone under 18 from being a patient eligible for marijuana. It prohibits use on any public property, schools, school grounds, school buses, etc. Region 18's policy prohibiting any marijuana possession remains in effect.

Marijuana Research Update:

Marijuana can be addictive. If use begins in adolescence, the dependence rate is 1 in 6; for adults the dependence rate is 1 in 9. (National Institute on Drug Abuse-NIDA)

Heavy (nearly daily) use of marijuana in adolescence also can lead to a reduction in intelligence, as marijuana affects centers in the brain for memory and learning. (Meier, M, et al.
